'The moment that mattered to me was when I received my headteacher sticker – I felt very proud!' Noah Year 6



EYFS





This week the children in Early Years have particularly enjoyed STEM week. We have been learning about the different properties of materials and then predicting whether they will float or sink. We then sorted them into two piles.

The children then had a go at making their own boats using recycled materials. Children used their new knowledge to help them build boats that would float. 'I am using a bag to make my boat waterproof'.

Following our White Rose math's the children have started to learn about number bonds to 10 (2 parts). We used Numicon as our manipulative to try and find all the different ways of making 10.










Year 1 have really enjoyed their STEM project. Their design brief was to design and build a vessel that will float on water. To achieve this, they firstly had to consider which materials would be suitable to use. They made predictions and observed some different everyday objects float or sink. Then Year 1 learned about different vessels and labelled parts of a sailboat. They then worked collaboratively as a 'crew' to design and build a vessel. Lots of fun was had testing them on water!











2 - We then had to compare our characteristics with other children and we learnt that we are all different but we can always find something we have in common for example we might have the same eye colour, pets or number of siblings.



On Monday Year 2 had a special workshop from 'Anna Outdoors'! During the day the children searched for bugs in the woods, had to sort different insects depending on their habitat and key features. We played team building games and they especially enjoyed playing 'Animal Olympics'

The children got to investigate the pond and made an exciting discovery of frogspawn! Our other favourite moment was when we encountered lots of butterflies (some even landed on us)!

The children learnt lots of facts from Anna and we really enjoyed our workshop!































In science, the children worked in pairs to sort the rocks by type; Igneous, Metamorphic or Sedimentary. They discussed how each rock type is formed and what characteristics each rock would have.

This week, the children have written some wonderful persuasive letters inspired by our current text 'The Firework Maker's Daughter'. They have included expanded noun phrases and rhetorical questions. It has been great to see the children use persuasive techniques to persuade a character to let them be a firework maker.







YEAR 3

What a fantastic week year 4 have had! We started the week by learning about deforestation and why it is important to save the rainforests. In English, we have written an informal letter to persuade loggers not to cut down a tree in the Amazon based on our text, The Great Kapok Tree. The children are using persuasive and emotive language to get their arguments across.

We have also created boats as part of our STEM project- the main aim was to create a boat that could be propelled across water and the children used different methods including balloons,

magnets and elastic bands to achieve this. They worked in groups to make decisions and problem solve. We are looking forward to testing their boats!



YEAR 5

Year 5 have continued their work on Yusra Swims this week to write a formal persuasive letter to the IOC to request being part of the Olympic Refugee Team in the role of Yusra Mardini. Children have been tasked with including persuasive phrases and the subjunctive mood.

This week has also been STEM week across the school. Year 5 are challenged with designing and building a boat which can propel itself. They have investigated joining techniques and begun building their designs whilst working in groups.






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This week Year 6 have enjoyed their STEM project: Sink or Swim, whereby they were tasked to design, build and test a motorized fan boat. The children began by deciding their roles within small groups before beginning their design stage. They children had to consider which materials would float and be stable upon water. Following that, the building process began. The children used various materials and different joining techniques to initially build the hull before circuit building and mounting the propeller. We then tested whether the boats floated and were able to move before making additional changes and evaluating. A great couple of STEM Days.
